Key Gains

- develop and/or transfer skill to strengthen confidence and competitiveness
- acquire work experience in new workplace role
- enhance skills and work experience on your resume and for interviews

Key Considerations

- focus on the near-term experience and skills development benefits for longterm gains, not on the title or salary
- volunteering can offer a great opportunity to acquire experience and develop a skill in a low-risk environment
- bridge roles can relieve some of the mental stress of job search which translates to more positive energy for interviews and networking

Therefore, she relinquished concerns about title and salary in favor of focus on bridge roles that would recalibrate her career and get her on a new trajectory.
